
Books ranging from "The Lorax" by Dr. Seuss to "Speak" by Laurie Halse Anderson, are being banned in various schools, libraries, and classrooms across the country and have been for decades. To be clear, there is no set of books universally banned from schools, but rather, the concept of "banned books" refers to texts that are frequently questioned in schools and libraries throughout the nation.

Many books being banned include literary classics that have been taught in many classrooms. For example, international classic "Fahrenheit 451" has faced many challenges since its publication in 1953, although many find it ironic that this book ABOUT censorship often FACES censorship.

Fahrenheit 451 is often challenged for many of the same reasons that other texts commonly face censorship, including the use of profanity, content deemed too sexual, and/or a character's suicide or drug abuse. These topics are seen as controversial, even though they're very real in the modern world. Discussing such topics in a controlled environment where students can safely learn about them, such as a classroom, can be more beneficial than hiding them away.

Many of the books that top the American Library Association's Banned and Challenged List for 2021 are written by or about individuals from marginalized communities. By banning these books, we erase those communities' struggles and triumphs from our history and prevent significant numbers of students from seeing themselves represented in our schools and libraries. Schools are a place where students can learn, and the controlled environment of the classroom is the perfect place to have these sometimes heavy conversations that allow students an amazing opportunity to learn and grow. Teachers shouldn't feel as though they should shy away from teaching books with quality content, but rather they should lean into it as an opportunity to help students develop their own thoughts, opinions, and ideas about the realities of the world around them.

After acknowledging the damage that banning a book does, you can take a step towards keeping other banned books on the shelves by signing petitions that protect banned books and joining banned books clubs in order to protest this modern wave of censorship. Keeping challenged books around will have a positive impact on the education system today and can lead the world to a more empathetic and understanding future.

On Thursday, October 13, the IBHS volleyball team held its second ever Pink Out Night against Hartsburg-Emden after adopting the event from IBHS girls basketball. The event featured twelve silent auction baskets and a raffle in order to maximize contributions to breast cancer research, raising nearly \$1,250 for the Susan G. Komen Foundation, a breast cancer research organization.

This number does not include the money raised from t-shirt sales, with that aspect of the fundraiser estimated to bring in around \$300. Regardless, the amount raised is quite substantial considering that this is the event's first year as a fundraiser attached to a volleyball game.

Last year, the team hosted a pink out night simply to raise awareness for those impacted by breast cancer or the loss of loved ones to breast cancer.

This year, though, Head Coach Ms. McCormick and her team decided to partner with Illini Bluffs High School's National Honor Society in order

to organize an event that would be able to bring in money for this important cause. October 13 is Metastatic Breast Cancer Awareness Day, so the game date lined up perfectly in order to create the most impactful event to raise awareness and money for breast cancer.

"Since we're such a small community, giving to this cause is a great way to show support for our breast cancer survivors," said Brooke B., IBHS junior and volleyball player.

At the game, cancer survivors were asked to stand up so that they could be recognized for their courage and bravery. Three survivors were in attendance, including Illini Bluffs custodian, Shirley Lee.

"This event means a lot to me. It's so important to see these people come out for this cause; It's amazing to see," said Lee.

Truly, the students on the IBHS National Honor Society and the IBHS volleyball team have demonstrated what it means to be leaders in their

community by creating a united coalition dedicated to helping find a cure for breast cancer. Our hearts go out to all survivors and loved ones of individuals who are fighting, or have fought with, this devastating disease.

Deep, dark smiles carved into faces.






Stores

Some students have seen enough horror movies to know exactly how to survive. They're smart enough to know, when there's a ghost-faced killer on the loose, not to separate


