



"You get what you work for, the amount of effort you put into something is what you receive," says Sophia.


Many students and teachers recognize also recognize her leadership ability. An example of her

## Women's History Month

Society told them to stay at home. It told them they didn't have a right to learn or vote and that they didn't belong in a "man's" world. Despite this, innumerable groups of women have blazed their own trail, turned heads, and even altered the course of history altogether.

March is Women's History month, a time to acknowledge women who have often gone unacknowledged.

Let's start this article with the hidden faces, the ones that the history books forget to tell: Henrietta Lacks, or more specifically, her cells that changed the world. In 1951, Lacks was hospitalized at Johns Hopkins, where a tumor was found on her. The experts took a sample of her cancer cells during a biopsy, where they were later sent to Dr. George Grey. The cells were unlike anything he had ever seen before; they didn't die quickly unlike the other cells. Her cells doubled approximately every 24 hours. From that point on, her cells have helped researchers with advances in HPV and Polio vaccinations, medications for HPV and AIDS, and even new breakthroughs such as invitro fertilization. Today her cells are still helping. During the pandemic's start, Henerieta's Cells were used in essential research for COVID-19. Without Henrietta Lacks, medicine would not be where it is today.

Another hidden face of women's history month is Marie Curie. When Marie's name is mentioned in science classes, few genuinely know much about her and her outstanding achievements. She has always had a great hunger for knowledge, working hard to learn and continue reading despite living in abject poverty. She desired to be a teacher, but it was difficult without a formal high school education. Knowing her longing for knowledge, her sister offered her an opportunity to stay in Paris and attend university, where she went in 1891. While in Paris, Curie met her future husband, Pierre Curie, who has the same desire for knowledge. After marriage, the Curies began working on researching invisible rays that are produced by uranium.

Curie believed she had found a new chemical element when researching minerals such as pitchblende, which contains uranium ore. Over the course of their research, they were highly exposed to radioactivity. Marie blazed her own trail in the Science industry, being the first woman to receive a Nobel Prize. In 1903, she received half of a Nobel Prize for physics, while the other half was given to her husband. Later, in 1911, she received a second Nobel in chemistry for her work in radioactivity. To this day, she is the only woman to receive two Nobel Prizes. Without her drive, we would not have some of the modern day technologies that we use in medicine today; she helped search for treatments of cancer and also x rays with her studies with radioactivity.

A modern-day woman who is changing the world one sail at a time is Emily Penn. While hitching-hiking across water on a biofuel boat, she was led through the Pacific Garbage patch. Penn had studied in architecture and was headed for Australia for a job as an architect. But after going through this patch, Penn was appalled and began brainstorming ways to help. Since then, she has worked on collecting information about plastic pollution and ways to prevent it.

On her journey to cutting down pollution, Penn founded eXXpedition, a group of women who go on trips to collect data on the microplastics found in the ocean in order to discover solutions for the pollution issue at hand. In addition to this work, Penn has led community clean-ups, which prompted her to launch a platform called SHiFT in 2020.

This platform allows people to find numerous solutions to help ocean pollution in the best way for them. On the SHiFT platform, there are numerous options to click on that give you in depth information, and the challenges and benefits that come with it. For example, it gives tips. For example, "Utilize plastic-free bubble wrap." It then explains that there is an alternative to the bubble wrap called Flexi-Hex. This is a cardboard option that uses a honeycomb-like shape to protect the package.

For her hard work, Penn has won many awards, such as the Fitzroy Award at the 2016 Ocean Awards. She is also the youngest recipient of the Yachtmaster of the Year, not to mention the only woman. Penn wishes to inspire a whole community of changemakers that, much like her, strive to make an impact on our planet.

## How to Build a Mini Garden

Illinois' conversion from the prairie state to the state in which the amount of corn probably triples the amount of people has been, quite frankly, disappointing. With the warm weather approaching, now is the perfect time to bring back the rainbow beauty that once flooded this state.

Making a pollinator garden is the number one way to #SaveTheBees. Providing an abundance of food will make bee's lives just so much easier. Honestly, it's not that difficult on your end either. No green thumb needed.

### Step 1: Pick a location

You have to pick a spot which would work best for you. This area would preferably be a low traffic area with a decent amount of sunshine. Flowering plants typically require a decent amount of sun to create blossoms, so try to find an area that has partial sun, or full sun, to create the best results.

### Step 2: Choose your plants

Now, to create a pollinator garden, you want to have plants that create a lot of flowers. Ideally, one would choose plants native to Illinois, but you don't have to. Some beautiful flowers native to our state are Cone Flowers, the Blue Flag Iris, or even some traditional Irises.

If those aren't your cup of tea, there are other plants, of course. You can just go to the store and find a wildflower seed mix.

### Step 3: Check planting dates

Now, different flowers require to go into the ground at different times, requiring a specific temperature, hardness of the soil, or amount of rainfall. It typically says on the packet when to put the seeds in the ground, so make sure to check the package before you plant.

### Step 4: Plant the seeds

Finally, just put the seeds in the ground. Water when needed, and witness the fruits of your labor grow!! It's honestly easier than you anticipate. You can jazz it up for your family friendly pollinators by adding a hummingbird feeder filled with a white sugar syrup or a little bird bath for both birds and bees alike. I recommend adding cute little mushrooms and fairy-like decor to create a magical area all your own!
