


Before leaving, Grace stated, "I'm excited to hang out with all of my friends before saying goodbye. For many, this will be the last time that I see them".






The local robotics team has made it to the World Championship in Houston, Texas! This team, the 1756 Argos team, has been doing robotics for 17 years now in a program called FIRST, For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology, Robotics.

FIRST Robotics is a worldwide program whose goal is to promote science and technology. They do this through an event where every January a challenge is released where teams across the world compete to build the best robot for that game. After building robots to play the game given to them, teams compete against each other in local regional competitions. The winner of regionals then gets sent on their way to the World Championship.

Argos has made it to the World Championship many times throughout its history. Last year, they were a finalist in their division, which is a very large feat. Sadly, Argos ended up losing to the team that won the Championship. Regardless of their loss, it has fueled their determination to have their robot win this year's championship.




Chess.com not only lets you play online against other people, but it also has tutorials and puzzles to help players develop skills needed to attack, defend, and after doing everything properly, checkmate.

Everyone knows the feeling of laying on your bed at 3 A.M. and scrolling through TikTok instead of sleeping, but what if one day TikTok is banned forever?

Unfortunately, that day may come sooner rather than later. For many people, TikTok is a part of everyday life, and whether they like to admit it or not, the elimination of the app from US app stores could spell trouble for all. Most people don't want to get rid of the app and would do the unthinkable to keep TikTok, seeing as thousands of people make their money on the app alone.

This wasn't the main concern for U.S. Congressmen though, as they were most concerned with the online safety of the app's users. Congress had reason to believe that TikTok was downloading and using information from the U.S. way back in 2020 when Donald Trump was president; then, he proposed that ByteDance, the creator of TikTok, sell a portion of the company to Microsoft, believing that the app would be less of a safety concern if the U.S. owned a portion of the app.

Recently, the U.S. Congress approved a motion to ban TikTok on all federal government-issued devices completely. Most people are against this choice made by Congress, seeing as there is no evidence that TikTok is using this data. Although most people are against the ban, some of the reasons Congress is trying to ban it are quite understandable.

TikTok is able to collect a lot of personal information from users. In the app's privacy

policy, whenever you watch, upload, like, or even bookmark videos or content, TikTok can, and will, collect the following information:

-Any account/profile information and data (name, age, username, phone number, profile image, email, and password).

-Any user-generated content uploaded to the app (including stories, videos, comments, and photos).

-Messages.

-Information used to purchase something through the app (Card numbers, billing, and shipping information, and even third-party payment apps).

With the Congress concerned that TikTok is using this information, they invited TikTok to discuss this matter. TikTok CEO, Shou Zi Chew, appeared before Congress on March 23 to attend the hearing of TikTok.

Chew states, "This comes at a pivotal moment for us. This could take TikTok away from all 150 million of you."

Chew has told the media that TikTok does not threaten U.S. interests. He has shown in many videos that the app is safe for all of its users by showing him and his own children using the app safely and appropriately. This leads most people to believe the ban is unnecessary and irrelevant to everyday life.

Although the potential ban of TikTok probably won't be going away anytime soon, these concerns are starting to wander through the minds of millions of citizens. People around the world have just one decision; to delete the app, or to keep scrolling.

But never failing to move.


I am from a clumsy kid who was always quiet

After my time here in school comes to an end, I will be attending ICC for industrial mathematics and Mandarin oranges.


Grace Thomas: Editor

Lillian Karl: Reporter


