Creation of community garden offers new opportunities to school and community.

The newly constructed Community Garden at Illini Bluffs High School has introduced many new opportunities to Illini Bluffs elementary, middle, and high school. These many bonuses of our brand new student-built Community Garden include salad bar additions, greater classroom and student skill development opportunities, increased community contribution efforts, and much more.

"We wanted to expose kids to gardening because a lot of kids have never done it before," incumbent superintendent Dr. Roger Alvey said when asked about his initial hopes for the garden. Dr. Alvey wrote the grant last year alongside high school principal and future superintendent Mr. Dimitri Almasi and assistant superintendent Mr. Cody Martzluf.

"We also wanted to hopefully make an opportunity for older kids to work with younger kids simultaneously," Dr. Alvey said.

However, before anything could happen in regard to the garden, the garden needed to be constructed.

At the end of April 2023, Mr. Teel's Industrial Technology students came together and began to

These tomatoes are not the only thing our school is planning to utilize from the garden.

"The miniature pumpkins are going to get used for the little kids. We will do those around Halloween," he followed. The possibility of utilizing the community garden in the classroom was also brought up, specifically in Foods class.

"If I get a bunch of zucchini, students could cut them up for zucchini bread," Mr. Murphy added.

Some have expressed their hope that the plants grown in the garden will be used not only for classes and lunch around the school, but also to help support families around the community.

"It would be really cool if we could manage to take what we were growing in the garden and have it contribute to what's going on around the area eventually," stated Lauren Classen, one of the Interact students who contributed to the planting of the garden over the summer.

She and many others are eager for new opportunities and what the future has to hold for our community garden.






Students Fisher D. and Hank A. play bags at the School Luau.


1. Barbie - ☆☆☆☆☆

IB Soccer kicks off new season.

The new school year opened up many new opportunities for your Illini Bluffs/Farmington Soccer Team. The Tigers, having been eliminated by Peoria Christian last year in regionals, look to bounce back this season.

Losing seniors Paul Ishikawa, Ella Wight, Grace Hutchinson, CJ Grice, Avery Speck and Farmington Co-op player Ayden Ackers hurt the team; however, given the number of senior injuries last year, the current players are primed for gameplay without these members of the team.

With the graduated seniors departing, the Tigers are keeping their young core of starters together from last year, aided by a talented freshman class.

Coach Gerard Smith and Assistant Coach Brock Aksun have been coaching the IB Soccer Team for many years now and, as of 2020, have been able to incorporate interested players from Farmington as well.

Last season, the IB/Farmington Tigers were tied in goals scored by Ian O. and Devon W. with 7. The next top goal scorer was Will G. with 6, but with new freshmen and core veteran leadership, the goal scoring field should be open for everyone on the pitch.

On the defensive side, senior goalie Hank A. is staying the Tigers' primary goalkeeper and for good

measure. Last year, Hank saved 210 goals, letting in only 36 goals all season.

And while the defensive line will be controlled by Hank, the two main defenders, seniors Wyatt H. and Levi A., make Hank's job easier as the most trusted defenders to get the ball away from our goal.

"Levi and Wyatt are the best duo on the team because they have the most chemistry while playing together," Hank A. said when asked about the two.

Both of these experienced players are sure to be instrumental to success later in the season and put up a valiant effort at the Pekin Invitational Tournament.

The Tigers had high hopes going into the Pekin tournament, but didn't play as the team they are. Many incidents happened before the tournament that hindered their progress, with the game against Monmouth being canceled and three straight practices taking place in the elementary gym due to excessive outdoor temperatures. And as the Tigers were set to face Pekin in the first game, they were denied the opportunity because of inclement weather that caused the game to be canceled.

The first game of the tournament thereafter didn't go so well, as Monmouth would create a commanding 3-0 lead at halftime. At halftime, another storm occurred, canceling the remainder of the game and preventing the Tigers from earning redemption in the second half.

After, the team would go to Willow Elementary School and relax and wait for their next game to start. At Willow, coaches and players talked about improvements for the next game. These improvements included passing, which has been a weak point in the past few years. With the new freshmen and much-needed practice, though, the Tigers came out and passed during their game against IVC, which led to plenty of shots on goal. Unfortunately for the Tigers, though, none of the goals would be completed successfully, causing the Tigers to fall to IVC 1-0.

After the game against Canton on Aug. 31 that resulted in a 5-2 win for the Tigers, I was able to sit and talk to Head Coach Gerard Smith for a quick Q & A about the season.

Q. "What do you think the strengths are for this year?"

A. "Strengths for this year would be that we are scoring goals, playing with more togetherness, and playing a lot stronger this year."

Q."What are the weaknesses for this year?"

A. "We still aren't passing enough in games; passing isn't as consistent as it should be, and the passing gets less when the games get going. Our heads go down as we get scored on early, but when we are confident, our heads stay up."

Q."Will the lineup for the games be consistent or will they be switched up?"

A. "Game by game there will be changes; I think that's fair, but I think we will be more consistent. Also, we will have to deal with injuries, suspensions, and then we may have to change it."
