Phone policy

The new school year began with one notable change: the phone policy. The new policy has had an impact on Illini Bluffs, but the opinions on the shift are varied.

The current phone policy in the Illini Bluffs handbook is: cell phones are not allowed in the classroom, and if a student is found to have one they will be sent to the office with the phone; teachers must get permission from the principal to allow students to use cell phones with a prepared explanation that the use of a cell phone will enhance and add value to the learning process; the disciplinary action for the first time the student is caught with a phone in class is the student will have to keep their phone in the office for the remainder of the day and the second offense requires a guardian to pick up the phone from the office.

So the question is raised, why did it come into place?

"The principal and the teachers collaborate," Superintendent Mr. Almasi said. "On it, they discuss the pros and cons of having phones and what they want to do. They present that policy within the handbook to me, discussing the ins and outs of it, and then we give it to the board for approval. The expectation is that phones should not be with the student and should be put into the locker until the end of the day."

Almasi has approved and enforced the phone policy, but he has acknowledged and understands that it is not a perfect policy and that the school as a whole isn't entirely in agreement on it.

"There were boundaries when we were allowed to have our phones; I think people just didn't put their foot down when it came to respecting them," senior Shelby said.

Shelby has expressed that she understands why they have the rule put into place and understands the benefits; however, she has bigger concerns.

"I have a 3-year-old who isn't in school in the mornings, and there's like about an hour window where I'm all set," Shelby said. "I know that people think that it's easier to call the office and stuff, but still, if there's an emergency and I'm at school, it's a lot easier for them to get hold of me."

The policy affected everyone in different ways because it was aimed at the classroom environment and management.

"It depends on the teacher," senior Eric P. said. "Some classes seem a lot more focused; however, I noticed some classes lose focus because they want to socialize, disturbing the classroom."

Eric is pro-phone policy and believes it was a good decision by the administration. He explained that the phone policy has improved the control that teachers have and eliminated the distractions of phones. He expresses that it was and still is dependent on the teacher.

"The policy has increased my efficiency for sure, not having the distraction because I know some people are getting out of the bad habit of being on their phones most of the time. Personally, I have been more on top of things because I don't have my phone to worry about," Eric said.

Yet that's not all that was the concern before the phone policy, and why they established it.

"It might be a cultural change with your generation," English teacher and librarian Mrs. Seamen said. "As technology changes and evolves, you're going to see changes within policies across the nation," Seamen said.

She also talked about AI and how, at the time when AI became popular, new policies were created, and with the phone, it undermined those policies.

"You're running the risk that the

information that you're getting from your students is AI-generated, and more and more, as AI gets smarter, it is gonna be harder and harder and more expensive to identify whether or not it is AI," Seamen said.

The opinion of the people of the school is varied and vast, but as of now, the phone policy will be staying.

His album hit a new career-high peak of number three on the Billboard 200 All-Genre Chart


"Man's Best Friend,"


