Glasford

Christmas spirit in the Glasford area doesn't happen on its own; months of planning go into it. Everyone involved in the process must follow through with their crucial roles, since many steps have to happen before the full Christmas effect can be seen.

The kick-off to the spirit typically starts with the Illini Bluffs school district on Oct. 31, with their meeting for the food drive baskets. Feeding those in need throughout our community is the first step in preparing everyone for the holiday season.

All of Illini Bluffs plays a role in collecting items. The elementary students have a week to bring in as many Jell-O boxes as they can; the middle school students have a jar for each grade to put money into, and whichever grade raises the most money wins; and the high school students have a canned food drive, each grade racing to get the desired items before the other grades do.

Roughly around 10,000 items raised during this time will be delivered to the American Legion by the National Honor Society.

"We help with delivery, and we load everything up into trailers. We take it down to the legion. Unload and sort the food as well," National Honor Society Coordinator Mrs. Roderick, said.

Later on, after everything is sorted and ready for delivery, the boys' basketball team comes into play by delivering the baskets to the families.

Up at the top of the hill, a lot goes into decorating the town, including the 'Happy Holidays' sign, the memorial wreaths, and the lights throughout the town and along Main Street, all of which are installed by Keith Reimer and Tammy Stetler, the village treasurer.

"I have to maintain the Christmas lights. We decorate some of the park, and make the wreaths that someone can buy in memory of someone. [Tammy] and I have been doing this for probably 25 years or more," Keith Reimer said.

The effort that is put into decorating for the holidays is noticed by everyone. It truly plays a factor in being a part of the Glasford community during the Christmas season.

"Glasford's show of Christmas spirit through their 'Happy Holidays' sign, along with their other festive decorations, brings me immense joy and incites a sense of holiday cheer in me," junior Addy D. said.

The Glasford community is not the only one getting ready for the holiday season. Lake Camelot is also getting into the spirit with the Santa Breakfast led by Kindra Bruninga.

"I started volunteering with the Lake Camelot Activities Club Breakfast with Santa approximately five years ago. In the last two years, I took over leading the breakfast with Santa, which is the responsibility of overseeing everything and providing for a successful morning," Bruninga said. "Breakfast with Santa allows the community to come together to celebrate the magic of Christmas. It allows our children to delight in a morning of happiness."

Weather whys: Snow tornadoes

Have you ever wondered if there could be a tornado while it is snowing? Well, yes, there can, but they are even more rare than you would think.

A snow tornado is a column of spinning air that forms from a strong thunderstorm environment with below freezing temperatures. This type of thunderstorm is usually in a snow squall. What is a snow squall you might ask? A snow squall is an intense period of moderate to heavy snow that lasts less than one hour

Snow tornadoes are also commonly confused with Snow Devils which are Dust Devils, but with snow. These are created by a column of air that spins loose snow on the ground creating a tornado like look. Snow devils are generally harmless and don't cause much damage.

This given, snow tornadoes are very rare like previously mentioned, with only four ever being recorded in Ontario, Navajo nation, Scotland, and Greece. The one that occurred in Ontario is the strongest on record with 90 mph winds, classifying it as an EF-1 and causing minimal damage to areas it hit.



Christmas in Peoria over the decades

The anticipation of a long day of waiting for the mail truck to hit your road to deliver the Christmas catalogs has been a feeling that has been around for decades. While certain staples like these magazines have been around for decades, so have Christmas traditions in the beloved city of Peoria, Illinois.

In the late 1880's the Santa Claus Parade brought much attention and traffic to the streets. The parade is the longest-running Santa Claus Parade in the country. At the start of the planning, it started with the construction on the Upper Free Bridge over the Illinois River; Boats and Derricks carrying 50 stonemasons

formed the parade that came down the river from Chillicothe, IL. Allegedly, the parade earned its name when the Jolly Old Elf himself came down the river on one of the boats.

Today, the parade is still around; however, it no longer occurs with boats down the river. The parade makes its way down the streets of Downtown Peoria. It ends its route when Mr. and Mrs. Claus make their way into town. They are ushered by around 60 costumed characters, marching bands and decorated floats. As of this year, it was the parade's 138th year in attendance.

To light up the town, The Festival of Lights was started in 1984, and there has never been

a light show parade in school groups and Central Illinois, so this business vehicles. was a first.

In the 80s, the parade floats were mostly constructed of wood, wrapped with chicken wire and covered with spray foam. One of the most memorable floats that was put together was the Hendrick's Star, which was put together in the Heavyweights for one of the festival volunteers, Andrew Hendricks. From there, volunteers added lights to make the lights visible since the parade occurred at night.

In the first parade, there were a total of 19 floats, including seven large ones to represent popular Christmas carols, and 12 smaller floats escorted with walking costumed characters, scouts,

40 years later, the Hendrick's Star is still a part of the festival and is involved in many ways. The star shines over the city bluff in VFW Park. Recently, the light show was featured on season eight of ABC's "The Great Christmas Light Fight," winning division.

"Christmas Vacation'



Best animated Christmas movie




"A Charlie Brown Christmas"

The tree was a white pyramid with white garland and colored ornaments. People were absolutely fascinated by the attraction and couldn't wait to make their yearly visit; however, when the tree was damaged in a flood for the second time, the idea was scrapped, and later on, Bergner's filed for

bankruptcy. Today, the restored "talking tree" resides in Urban Artifacts for anyone interested in recapturing the nostalgia.

While we lost Bergner's, Bass Pro opened in 2011 bringing the Christmas spark back to the area. Each year, Santa makes his way to town by a parade, escorted by the fire department in his hot ride: a boat. Kids gather dressed up, anxiously waiting to meet him and his elves. The store also has many interactive components in its toy land, including games, toys and crafts for the children, bringing the true spark of Christmas back to the greater Peoria area!
